



- NATIONAL LEGISLATIVE - SCORECARD FOR THE 113TH CONGRESS

TWO YEARS AGO, we reported that fundamental public health and environmental protections were under attack in the 112th Congress. The situation has remained largely the same to date in the 113th Congress. [In 2013 and 2014, the U.S. House of Representatives has voted to block federal agency progress in all of Clean Water Action's priority campaign areas,](#) including restoring Clean Water Act protection to streams and wetlands and cleaning up toxic coal ash. Similar measures have not been able to pass in the U.S. Senate.

Clean Water Action tracks key votes and compiled this Scorecard to help members and others assess the votes of U.S. Representatives and Senators on policies related to clean water, clean air, public health, climate change and energy. [The upcoming 2014 mid-term elections are an opportunity to hold Members of Congress accountable for their votes.](#)

SCORING

Clean Water Action tallied 14 U.S. House votes and 9 U.S. Senate votes for each Representative and Senator in Clean Water Action states. To earn a perfect "100%" a U.S. House Representative would need to have voted "No" on 12 of the 14 scored House anti-environment measures and a "Yes" on two of the scored House proposals; in the Senate, four "Yes" votes and five "No" votes were required.



2013–2014 U.S. SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

KEY SENATE VOTES IN 2013

Federal Budget 2014

Senator Patty Murray's (D-WA) amendment forced a vote on House Budget Committee Chair Rep. Ryan's (R-WI) alternative budget, which included drastic cuts to health and environmental protections and billions of dollars in subsidies and tax breaks for Big Oil. [March 21, 2013; defeated 40-59]

Pro-environment vote was a NO vote.

Promoting Dirty Oil Project (Hoeven Amendment)

Senator John Hoeven [R-ND] sponsored this non-binding Resolution attached to the 2014 Federal Budget Resolution signaling support for the controversial Keystone XL pipeline, a project which threatens water resources and promotes reliance on dirty oil. [March 22, 2013; passed 62-37]

Pro-environment vote was a NO vote.

Toxic Air Pollution from Power Plants (Coats Amendment 2812)

Senator Dan Coats' (R-IN) amendment to the Federal Budget Resolution creates loopholes in programs meant to reduce mercury and other toxic pollution from power plants. [March 22, 2013; rejected 46-53]

Pro-environment vote was a NO vote.

Blocking Action on Climate (Inhofe Amendment 359)

Senator James Inhofe's (R-OK) amendment to the federal budget resolution would cut funding for federal agency programs to reduce pollution causing climate change. [March 22, 2013; defeated 47-52]

Pro-environment vote was a NO vote.

Choosing Dirty Water (Barrasso Amendment 868)

Senator John Barrasso's (R-WY) amendment to the Water Resources Development Act would have blocked U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) U.S. Army Corps of Engineers efforts to restore Clean Water Act protections to streams and wetlands, including headwater streams providing drinking water to over 117 million people. [May 14, 2013; defeated 52-44]

Pro-environment vote was a NO vote.

Confirmation of Gina McCarthy

After 100 days of delay and intense scrutiny from Senate Republicans, the Senate voted on President Obama's nomination of Gina McCarthy to lead the Environmental Protection Agency. [July 18, 2013; passed 9-40]

Pro-environment vote was a YES vote.

KEY SENATE VOTES IN 2014

Limiting Influence of Money in Politics (S.J. Res. 19)

Constitutional Amendment would reduce the influence of money in politics. The Senate voted not to move forward on consideration on this important issue. [September 11, 2014; defeated 54-42]

Pro-environment vote was a YES vote (60 votes needed for passage).

Promoting Clean Energy (Wyden Amendment 3060)

The Expiring Provisions Improvement Reform and Efficiency (EXPIRE) Act, H.R. 3474, would have extended clean energy tax credits and other programs to promote renewable energy sources and energy efficiency. [May 15, 2014; defeated 53-40]

Pro-environment vote was a YES vote (60 votes needed for passage).

Promoting Energy Efficiency (S. 2262)

The bipartisan Energy Savings and Industrial Competitiveness Act of 2014 would have promoted energy efficiency innovation and saved consumers money. [May 12, 2014; defeated 55-36]

Pro-environment vote was a YES vote (60 votes needed for passage).

2013–2014 U.S. HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS

KEY HOUSE VOTES IN 2013

Federal Budget 2014 (H. Con. Res. 25)

Rep. Paul Ryan's (R-WI) budget included drastic cuts to agencies responsible for protecting health and natural resources and billions of dollars in subsidies and tax breaks for Big Oil. [March 21, 2013; passed 221-207].

Pro-environment vote was a NO vote.

Protecting All Water (Moran Amendment 1)

Rep. James Moran's (D-VA) amendment would have reversed Energy and Water Agencies spending bill language to block U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) work with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to restore Clean Water Act protections to streams and wetlands. [July 9, 2013; rejected 177-236]

Pro-environment vote was a YES vote.

Mountaintop Removal Coal Mining (Moran Amendment 2)

Rep. James Moran's (D-VA) amendment would have reversed Energy and Water Agencies spending bill language to block the Corps from strengthening water protections from pollution resulting from destructive coal mining practices. [July 9, 2013; rejected 188-226]

Pro-environment vote was a YES vote.

Dirty Water and Energy Spending Bill (H.R. 2609)

The 2014 Energy and Water Development and Related Agencies spending bill included language blocking important clean water protections, continuing subsidies for Big Oil and cuts to clean energy programs. [July 10, 2013; passed 227-198]

Pro-environment vote was a NO vote.

Toxic Coal Ash (H.R. 2218)

The Coal Residuals Reuse and Management Act of 2013 would prevent EPA from moving forward to regulate coal plant waste, the largest waste stream in the nation responsible for spills like the one into the Dan River in North Carolina in 2014. [July 25, 2013; passed 265-155]

Pro-environment vote was a NO vote.

Blocking Health, Water & Air Protections (H.R. 367)

The Regulations from the Executive in Need of Scrutiny (REINS) Act is a recurring anti-regulatory effort intended to delay new health and environmental protections by requiring redundant approval by Congress for all new programs. [August 2, 2013; passed 232-183]

Pro-environment vote was a NO vote.

Blocking Protections from Oil & Gas Drilling (H.R. 2728)

Rep. Bill Flores' (R-TX) Protecting States' Right to Promote American Energy Security Act would have blocked protections and research related to hydraulic fracturing oil and gas drilling. [November 20, 2013; passed 235-187]

Pro-environment vote was a NO vote.

KEY HOUSE VOTES IN 2014

Less Toxic Waste Clean-Up (H.R. 2279)

Rep. Cory Gardner's bill (R-CO) would weaken health protections from toxic waste sites, reduce community clean-up and put the cost of clean-up on taxpayers rather than polluters. [January 9, 2014; passed 225-188].

Pro-environment vote was a NO vote.

Blocking Climate Progress (H.R. 3826)

Bill introduced by Rep. Ed Whitfield (R-KY) to block EPA regulation of power plants, the largest source of global warming pollution that threatens public health and contributes to a changing climate. [March 6, 2014; passed 229-183]

Pro-environment vote was a NO vote.

Undermining Environmental Reviews (H.R. 2641)

The "Responsibly and Professionally Invigorating Development (RAPID) Act" would compromise the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), leading to less opportunity for public input, excess litigation and project delays. [March 6, 2014; passed 229-179]

Pro-environment vote was a NO vote.

Weakening Protections from Coal Mining Pollution (H.R. 2824)

Rep. Bill Johnson's (R-OH) bill would eliminate buffer zones around mountaintop removal mining, putting headwater streams more at risk. The bill also weakened other protections from surface coal mining activities. [March 25, 2014; passed 229-192]

Pro-environment vote was a NO vote.

Moving Backwards on Clean Water (LaMalfa Amendment 1024)

Rep. Doug LaMalfa's (R-CA) amendment to the Energy and Water Agencies spending bill creates a license to pollute for agricultural and other activities and removes EPA's authority to act on activities that pose extreme threats to water, health and wildlife. [July 10, 2014; passed 239-182]

Pro-environment vote was a NO vote.

Gutting Water and Health Protections & Promoting Dirty Energy (H.R. 4923)

The Energy and Water Development and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2015 would block an EPA/Corps proposal to restore Clean Water Act protections for critical water bodies, promote dirty fossil fuels and perpetuate climate change science denial. [July 10, 2014; passed 253-170]

Pro-environment vote was a NO vote.

Choosing Dirty Water (H.R. 5078)

The "Waters of the United States Regulatory Overreach Protection Act, introduced by Rep. Steve Southerland (R-FL), blocks a critical EPA/Corps proposal to restore Clean Water Act protections to streams and wetlands, including headwater streams providing drinking water to over 117 million people. The Obama Administration issued a strong veto threat on this bill. [September 9, 2014; passed 262-152]

Pro-environment vote was a NO vote.
